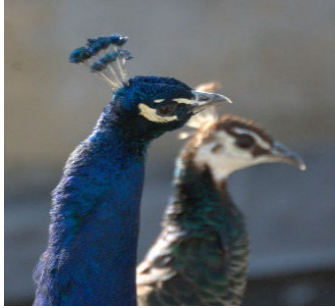


# DRINK COMBINATIONS

## In a full-service restaurant

32B-1-102 (91), 32B-4-422 (1)(a), 32B-5-304, 32B-6-205 (8)

In a full-service restaurant, a patron may have only two alcoholic beverages in front of them at one time, and only one of those beverages can be a spirituous liquor drink.



NO MORE THAN TWO

### LIQUOR SALES

- The primary liquor in a mixed drink is not to exceed 1.5 ounces
- the total amount of spirituous liquor in the beverage (including both the primary liquor and any secondary flavorings) may not exceed 2.5 ounces of spirituous alcohol.



### CAN DO EXAMPLES:

- A shot of whiskey and a single glass of wine
- Two single portions of wine
- One single portion of wine and one single portion of heavy beer
- Two single portions of beer



### CAN'T DO EXAMPLES:

- Two cocktails
- Two shots
- A shot and a cocktail



### WINE SALES

- Wine may be sold and served by the glass or individual portion in quantities not exceeding 5 ounces.
- Containers of wine no larger than 750 millimeters may be sold to individuals.
- If four or more patrons are sharing the wine, the bottle or container may be in a container not exceeding 1.5 liters (Magnum).
- FMBs and Heavy Beer may be sold and served in original containers not exceeding one liter.

### BEER SALES

- Beer may be sold to an individual patron, only in a container that does not exceed one liter.
- Beer may be sold to parties of two or more in a container, not exceeding 2 liters
